
















Reality: Affordable Housing











Increase in "De-Churched" Population in Charlotte








New Churches Planted Over Time


Percent with High School Diploma









Educational Attainment by Family Structure







Age Breakdown of Foster Kids





Where Foster Kids are Living









Immigrant vs. Refugee % in Greater Charlotte







This data shows if people have access to health care, and how it is provided.










Broad Religious Group Trajectory


